

- 3. Guide students to understand the content and modern significance of Chinese culture, inspire them to explore the meaning of life, enrich their humanities literacy, and construct ethical values.



Basic **Abilities**

Information Literacy



Courses meeting the following four information competency star competency standards:

- 1. Possess basic knowledge and skills in computers and networks.
- 2. Create documents, presentations, and spreadsheets.
- 3. Possess multimedia application skills.
- 4. Possess information security literacy.

Information ability is a graduation requirement for our students. Meeting any of the following criteria is sufficient:

- 1. Obtain an external professional IT skills certification approved by the university.
- 2. Complete and pass courses that meet the four information competency standards.
- 3. Pass the university's internal information competency test.

Note

- 1 Chinese Language: Separate classes for overseas Chinese students (limited to overseas Chinese and foreign students).
- 2 First-year English: Divided into advanced, intermediate, and basic levels based on students' English proficiency at admission. Students who meet the English course exemption criteria (refer to the Holistic Education Center website) may take 4 credits of "Second Foreign Language" courses as a substitute.
- 3 Second Foreign Languages include Japanese, French, German, Spanish, Italian, Korean, Vietnamese, Thai, Indonesian, and Polish.
- 4 Starting from the 2018 academic year, basic information competency is a university-wide graduation requirement for undergraduate students. For related regulations and information, please refer to the Basic Literacy Cultivation and Testing webpage

Understand the contributions of technology to civilization, focus on cultivating scientific methods and ethics, emphasize the harmonious relationship between humans and nature, implement popular science education.

Note

- 1 Students must complete 4 credits in each of the three domains: Humanities and Arts, Natural Sciences and Technology, and Social Sciences.
- 2 All courses are semester-long, typically offering 2 credits, and can be taken by students from freshman to senior year.
- 3 Each department can decide whether to exclude subjects from its own domain. Credits from excluded subjects taken by students will not count towards the general education course requirements.
- 4 Two-year in-service undergraduate program students must complete 2 credits in each domain, totaling 6 credits.


History of the Holistic Education Center

On February 1, 2000, our university established the "Holistic Education Center" as a college-level unit to coordinate and plan holistic education courses and teaching matters. The holistic education curriculum was officially implemented on August 1, 2000 in order to respond to changes and needs in university education. Our university began reviewing and revising the overall goals and structure of the holistic education curriculum starting from the 2008 academic year. On August 1, 2011, based on the revised overall goals of the holistic education curriculum, a new curriculum structure was implemented. This applies to undergraduate students enrolled from the 2011 academic year onwards. Students are required to complete 32 credits of holistic education courses to graduate.

Overall Goals of the Holistic Education Curriculum

To cultivate students with liberal arts knowledge, critical thinking skills, quality civic literacy, and basic social participation abilities, and to become well-rounded individuals with integrated bodies, minds, and spirits.

Freshman

2 Credits: Mandatory Course

Help students understand the ignificance of university education, the characteristics of the school's academic system, and various learning information, cultivating critical thinking and leadership abilities to create a successful university life.

Physical Education

Freshman Sophomore

O Credits: Mandatory Course (Freshman) Elective Course (Sophomore)

Cultivate students with positive concepts of physical activity and health, strengthen physical fitness and sports skills, enhance interpersonal interaction and teamwork abilities, develop lifelong physical activity habits, and achieve overall physical and mental development and self-realization goals.

Core Curriculum

Philosophy of Life

Sophomore or Junior

4 Credits: Mandatory Course

Cultivate students to think philosophically, understand their position in a changing environment, develop harmonious relationships with themselves and others, and use diverse thinking, problem-solving, reflection, and communication methods to establish a life philosophy that respects heaven and loves people.

Professional Ethics

Junior or Senior



2 Credits: Mandatory Course

Combine professionalism with ethics, guide students to recognize professional ethics, enhance a sense of responsibility, moral sense, and ethical sensitivity, and cultivate students' ability to analyze and make judgments in various situations.

Students in the two-year part-time program must take 2 credits each of University Orientation, Philosophy of Life, and Professional Ethics, totaling 6 credits, and do not need to take Physical Education courses.
